We are particularly focused on improving the health and well-being of the Aboriginal community and providing economic, social and cultural opportunities for our people. We aim to do this while maintaining the respect for the land and all people that is the heart of our culture and identity as Aboriginal people.

Our plan is for the future, for our children and our grandchildren.

Vision

A unified, healthy, harmonious, respectful, creative and educated Walgett Community, economically strong and living with care, nurture and respect for the land, for our ancestors, our elders, our adults, our youth, our children and future generations

Guiding Principles

- we leave this place a better place for those who follow
- we work for what the whole community needs, no-one left behind
- we respect the land as the basis of our life and culture
- we respect all people and all cultures
- we remember our history and the values of courage, excellence, and wisdom passed from our ancestors
- we support programs that are relevant, community based and sustainable
- we make decisions in an open, transparent, consensus manner
- we fully utilize the resources that we have
- we are responsible for our youth who are our future and teach them to be responsible and respectful and to provide input for the future as well

Main issues we face as a community

- government not working efficiently with the community, particularly a lack of communication and appropriate consultation
- lack of support and recognition for the CWP from government, local businesses and other major goods and service providers
- racism, stereotyping Aboriginal people,
- lack of respect and acknowledgement for our culture, our history and our people
- inequality and lack of opportunity
- no indoor youth recreation centre
- lack of resources, poor living conditions
- welfare mentality
- difficulty in accessing services
- low student retention and achievement rates and high rates of truancy within our education system
- low levels of literacy and numeracy throughout the whole community
- unacceptably high level of criminal activity and anti-social behaviour

- difficulty in accessing land and waters for traditional cultural activities and economic activities
- difficulty in owning land
- land and waters degradation
- too many liquor outlets and gambling facilities and lack of unlicensed entertainment
- overcrowding in housing leading to poor health and educational outcomes
- below average health care provision and co-ordination from government health providers
- inadequate maintenance of basic infrastructure and services by local and state government agencies
- poor communications and transport infrastructure

Our Community

Walgett is 270 kms north of Dubbo. It is located on the Namoi River close to the junction of the Barwon River.

Walgett is a rural community of 2400 people with approximately 1700 being Aboriginal. About 50 families live at Gingie village, 10 km west of the town, 40 families live at Namoi village, 3km north of the town. The remaining Aboriginal people live in the township.

The Aboriginal people living at Walgett now are mainly Gamilaraay, Yuwaalaraay and Ngiyambaa people, descendants of the traditional owners of these lands. Many of these were forced by the government to leave this country to live in missions and reserves elsewhere, but they kept coming back to live in Walgett. Even in the '60s, Aboriginal people could not enter Walgett after 6pm.

Many Aboriginal people of the town have worked hard to improve rights and services for Aboriginal people here, including the establishment of Aboriginal medical, legal and other services.

There are many local initiatives to maintain and pass on traditional languages and to preserve native vegetation and pass on traditional knowledge about this.

Walgett operates as a service centre for rural properties, mainly sheep, cattle grazing and cropping. This region has been experiencing severe drought conditions for the last three years and the local economy is depressed as a result. The shift to larger agricultural holdings and the consequent reduction in the regional population is also having a severe effect on the town's economy.

Organizations and programs dedicated to serving the Aboriginal community are now a major part of the town's current economy and wealth generation. These range from the money brought in through employment programs and social security payments, to all the positions employed through government and Aboriginal organizations servicing the Aboriginal community here.

The Walgett region has one of the lowest socio-economic statuses in NSW, one of the highest percentages of Aboriginal population, youth, unemployed and those not participating in the workforce. There has been high truancy rates at both Primary and High Schools, and high prevalence of petty crime, violence, alcohol, gambling and drug abuse.

Our Story, Our Plan

Our ancestors fought hard through their lives for our people and our rights. We wish to acknowledge the strength, courage and wisdom of our ancestors who lived with this land and were nurtured by the spirit here which kept them alive and well, living in harmony and unity.


We need to become a unified community of people, white and black, resting on values of what it is to be better human beings, creating a future for our children and grandchildren through careful husbandry of the resources of this land and through care and respect for all people.

The Aboriginal community of Walgett want to bring together all the people of this place into a harmonious, peaceful, creative, healthy and constructive community which will lead the way as a model around the country for a truly reconciled way to live in this land and with each other. This is a plan for the whole Walgett community.


Role and purpose

representatives from Government and non-Government agencies.


Our decision-making


This can mean that some decisions take longer than in the western world. However, this process creates decisions that are more effective in the long term. Consultation and participation in all our decision making is crucial to effective and long term community development.

The main role of the CWP is to endorse strategies, programs and projects, that are in line with our main aims and essential outcomes. Proposals for these will be presented to the CWP with an executive summary as well as more detailed outlines. The CWP will then formally endorse the proposals, request more information, or not endorse if it is felt they do not fit within the general aims and directions of the Strategic and Action plans.



Graphic 4: Map of how organizations support the Walgett Aboriginal Community and CWP to achieve their aims.


Priorities for our Community
