

Who are we?

As a government agency, we work alongside Aboriginal people and communities to make sure their voices are heard and their interests represented.

By leading and influencing change in government, we support the social, cultural and economic aspirations of Aboriginal people in NSW.

Ultimately, we build capacity and confidence:

changing and evolving the way our stakeholders think and work together to achieve positive outcomes.

OCHRE...

- OCHRE is the community-focused plan for Aboriginal Affairs in NSW.
- In 2012 and 2013 some 2,700 Aboriginal people in NSW stated that Aboriginal language and cultures, education and employment and accountability are important priorities for Aboriginal communities.
- The NSW Government responded with OCHRE (Opportunity, Choice, Healing, Responsibility, Empowerment).

A little bit of background

NSW government agreed to develop a NSW Aboriginal Languages Bill in November 2016, following the approval for a Bill consultation in March 2017

Extensive conversations with Aboriginal communities and stakeholders were held throughout NSW The Bill was considered by Parliament in October 2017 and became law on 24 October 2017

What is The Act?

The *Aboriginal Languages Act 2017* aims to **GROW, NURTURE** and **REVITALISE** First Peoples Language in NSW and has three parts:

PRE-AMBLE

Acknowledges the importance of re-awaking, nurturing and growing Aboriginal Languages and Aboriginal Ownership

ABORIGINAL LANGUAGES TRUST 'The Trust'

The establishment of the trust will be to resource local language activity. The Trust is governed by an Aboriginal board with relevant skills and experience

STRATEGIC PLAN

A 5 year strategic plan to guide investment and activities in language revival in NSW, within 2 years

Vision

The **ultimate aim** is for Aboriginal Languages to be widely spoken across NSW, in particular for future generations of First Peoples to be able to speak their own language

Aboriginal languages will strengthen connections with culture and identity, and improve the well-being of First Peoples



The Journey Continues

Aboriginal Languages Establishment Advisory Group (ALEAG) Interagency Working Group (IWG)

Internal Project Group (IPG)

The Children's Guardian – Janet Schorer

Office of the Children's Guardian, WWCC Risk Assessment Process

What is a Working with Children Check?

A Working with Children Check (WWCC) is one of the strategies used to protect children by screening people who:

- Work or volunteer with children
- Take care of children in their homes

You can apply online, then take identity documents to the RMS.

- Involves a full national criminal history check and a review of workplace misconduct findings
- The WWCC lasts 5 years
- Cleared applicants are subject to ongoing monitoring

Purpose of WWCC

To ensure the safety, welfare and well-being of children by identifying, and excluding, people with certain records from engaging in child-related employment

- A standardised and portable check
- Ability to seek information from a range of agencies to inform recommendations
- Makes both the individual and the employer accountable
- Just one of the mechanisms in place to help protect children

How do you do the Check?

We carry out a national criminal history check and have a department that reviews any findings of workplace misconduct. This includes:

- Dismissed/withdrawn offences
- · Court findings of Not Guilty
- Charges that were Quashed or Acquitted

The nature of the charge, the outcome of court proceedings, and the age of person at the time will impact the result of the application.

Schedule 1:


- Any charges of violence towards a child
- Any charges of sexual violence
- Juvenile convictions for violence towards a child or sexual violence
- 3+ violent charges
- Findings of misconduct involving children (workplace reports)
- Convictions for certain offences
- Common assault; using poison to endanger life

15(3) Provision

Allows the OCG to conduct a risk assessment if the applicant has records that may be relevant to the safety of children

- Domestic violence offences
- 16A notifications
- Serious violence towards an adult

Working with Children Check



What is a risk assessment?

• Gathering information to help understand if the applicant poses a risk to the safety of children

- Full criminal history
- Information from other government agencies
- Information from the applicant and referees
- Protective factors
- Real and appreciable risk
- Reasonable person and public interest tests

Why risk assess?

- Increase knowledge
- Aim to understand the person better
- Aim to understand risk better
- Not predicting, but managing
- Time limited (5 years)
- Accountable Risk Assessment

Moving Forward

We are considering how to improve the experience of Aboriginal applicants and our engagement with community

- What is an Aboriginal applicant's experience in the WWCC and how can we find these out?
- How can we make the application process easier?
- How can we look at risk of

individuals differently, informed by community, whilst meeting our legislative responsibilities?

Key areas for improvement

- 1. Communication with applicants
- 2. Providing information about the WWCC and the risk assessment process within Aboriginal communities
- 3. Encouraging participation in the risk assessment process including community 'reference'



Overview FACS Districts – Murrumbidgee, Far West & Western NSW

- o The highest reported risk in the district is **neglect** across all age groups, but more significantly in ages between 10-15.
- Aboriginal people are 7.3%
 of the district population (NSW

- 2.7%) but make up 41% of Child Protection reports. (FACS Data 2014)
- The district has 8.2% (568,000) of the NSW population (6,903,000) and utilises 6.2% Social Housing. (FACS Data 2014)
- The district has **20** of the top 30 'at risk' communities of domestic violence, with **452** compared to **381** incidents. (NSW State averages per 100,000 -BOSCAR 2016)
- o **15%** of our staff are Aboriginal across Community Services, Housing and Commissioning which is the highest for FACS statewide.

Notable Programs

Justice – Emergency Services – Learn to Swim (LTS) and River Safety Training (RST)

Funding was provided in 2017 for a two year program to provide free LTS and RST to all communities that had no providers in place.

This has allowed through the schools training to be provided to: Wilcannia, Menindee, Bourke, Enngonia, Walgett, Collarenebri, Coonamble and Gulargambone over two summers. This program will cease this season.

The Office of Sport is negotiating the funding of Royal Life Saving Association NSW, to provide this service into the future guaranteeing that all communities have a LTS program in place into the future and not reliant upon limited and adhoc funding.

Koori Health Knockout Challenge

Kris Stevens has lead the ongoing delivery of the KHKC program in Dubbo with great success. Will be seeking to bring NSW Health KHKC Staff on a road trip in 2019, seeking to re commence the program in our remote communities in 2019. Noting that Menindee and Wilcannia have had programs in the past but ceased some time ago.

ORISCON (Orana Region Indian Subcontinent Organisation) Cross Cultural Carnivals

In partnership with ORICSON, Dubbo City Council, Western Plains Cultural Centre, Dubbo Cricket Association, Cricket NSW, Panscott Media and Rotary International. An MOU with Dubbo City Council underpins an agreement between the above to undertake regular cross cultural sport and recreation events in the Orana region, as a vehicle for cultural undertaking and greater connectivity between cross cultural groups in the region.

Muslim Sport Engagement

Mark Horton will arrange Lifesaving training in Dareton/Wentworth.

Assisting the Muslim community in Dubbo to engage through sport, Basketball, Netball, Touch and Swimming club membership

Justice – Youth Development

Steve McLellan has developed and delivered sport management, coaching, refereeing and fitness programs in the JJ Centres. With inmates being released on good behaviour to participate in sport on game days. This program has seen 100% attendance and commitment from inmates and aims to provide a link back to community, volunteering and wellbeing.

Inmate refereeing and fitness program (Ronny Gibbs and Willy Barnes)

This program is now in its 2nd year, provides training in event and team management to inmates at wellington gaol. That they may remain fit and healthy when released have links to local sport clubs, with skills to be volunteers. There is a vacuum of referees for touch and rugby league in the region and is the single biggest impact to game being cancelled and the future of the sport.

A big contributor to there being no volunteers (or paid) referees is spectator behaviour which is not good. We are trying to change peoples attitudes and behaviour towards referees but it is a slow process and needs the support of the broader community, against individuals that are abusing referees and game officials.

All suggestions will be taken on board, so if anyone has any good ideas let us know.

Looking to expand this program from Wellington and Dubbo to Ivanhoe, Yetta Dhinnakkal and Broken Hill centres in 2019.

Murdi Paaki Regional Rugby League Council/Touch NSW and Touch Australia/ NRL and CRL Partnerships

Looking to expand this partnership to Basketball NSW in 2019 across all communities with a court to provide alternate sporting activity competition of an evening and out of the winter season cycle.

Say no to Domestic Violence

Will remain in place and is supported as an important component of the offices work. Although it remains unfunded to date for 2018.

Building Stronger Home Teams

In partnership with Sport Clubs in central west, targeted high need families to engage with sport through training in coaching and team management. Aim to expand in partnership with Aboriginal health service this program to the Murdi Paaki Region in 2019.

Active Kids Voucher Program

Provides \$100 per child to participate in sport and active recreation. Uptake in the MP region is VERY LOW (almost nil). This is disappointing and would like to see increases in 2019 or the program will see reduced funding over time. The Western team is working with the AK business unit to devise an easier way of administrating access to the voucher funds for remote communities. Pilots have been run in Enngonia and Ivanhoe (Ivanhoe being a great success!).

Act Belong Commit – Community Wellbeing

Now in its 7th year this multi partner project, supports the principal that sport and active recreation participation, through social and economic connection supported by physical activity, promotes strong mental wellbeing. This project has had great success engaging youth in positive mental health education and support services through sport club membership.
